Cage cleanup!!

The club is incredibly fortunate to have storage space at the park for our "stuff". It is in a working garage area and therefore it gets dirty over time and about every two years we need to give it a good clean up, throw out anything that has been sitting around too long, and make any repairs. Mark and Rod took on the cage cleanup while Dave, David and I took on the boat cleanup and the trailer wheels. Mark and Rod did an excellent job on the inside tasks and learned that we do have a good number of things in storage and make good use of the area at our disposal! The photo also shows the two boats that were displayed on the wall of the cage area, and formerly in the pavilion, that were brought down. If you have a notion that these boats should be cleaned up, updated, and put back on the water, they are easily accessible and can be taken to a home shop for refurbishing.

The boat was a straight forward clean up but the wheels on the trailer were another matter entirely and the challenge of this cage cleanup. At least two of the wheels constantly lose air and they all were looking pretty corroded. The two rears were on straight axels and the front on a pivot with a through bolt. The front was a piece of cake to remove, the rears anything but. The axels were well rusted and it looked like the end of the axels had been hammered on and had mushroomed out. Neither wheel would budge off the axel. A file was taken to the two axels to remove the mushroomed metal and the heavy rust, and with much filing and pounding both wheels were finally removed. There has been three wheels in storage that looked like they should fit the trailer, but they proved to be for ½ inch diameter axels whereas the axels were actually 5/8" diameter. New wheels were procured and are now on the trailer.

A job very well done by all, and the help was very much appreciated!

It always looks easy when you get there but there is a lot required to make these events come together.

Show and Tell

The best part of the meeting, and the basis for the gathering after the official meeting is over. First up was a comparison of stock versus modified.





These boats are the Atlantic Tug formerly offered by AguaCraft, now out of business. The boat on the left (in the right photo) was recently acquired by Dave Brinkman off eBay. The one on the right I purchased from former member Tom Johnson guite a few years ago. Mine is the first generation, Dave's the second, and there was also a third final version also. My upgrades were the subject of a previous show and tell and included painting many of the white plastic accessories/features on the boat a different color. Both boats are handsome boats on their own, but removing some of the white plastic gives the boat a more authentic appearance (in my opinion). See if you can notice the differences. I did this presentation by covering my boat for a "big reveal!" but honestly it was not the big oh-wow reveal that I thought it might be simply because the original boat is so good looking. My latest upgrade was to change the black line that holds the tire bumpers to the side of the hull to a brown line, which you will have to trust me, it was a nice change, but not noticeable above because that was already changed in Dave's second addition. The lights came with a separate 2-AA battery pack and it was not sufficient to light all the lights, and the ones that were lit were very dim. I saw this same boat on the water at a Light House Night and the lights were noticeably brighter so I don't know if something deteriorated or if something else was going on. I also have the companion AguaCraft boat, Bluefin - later renamed Bristol Bay, which is a fishing trawler and the lights were similarly dim. The solution was to install a 4-AA battery pack and bypass one of the holders so only 3-AA's are in series. This works really well on both boats! The lights now are maybe just a bit too bright though. In the gathering after the meeting John Bishop said that a voltage regulator would be the trick so that I could dial up the intensity that I needed, and he would help! So one more upgrade to go!

Next up was Mark Wolf who is just getting back into his Dynamic Models tug.



Mark promises to bring the boat back as progress is being made. With several larger boats under construction it may really transform our presence on the water when these boats are completed.


David Petrich brought his latest fast electric boat he is working on. David also belongs to the Twin City Model Boat Club which specializes in fast boats of all kinds on a pond by the Black Dog plant in Burnsville, on the south side of the Minnesota River. David gave a lot of good information on the assembly of this boat, which is a total custom built of David's, and like true customs some of the components are things already on hand in the shop. These are NASCAR boats so to speak as they only run in one direction so that rudder and other stability measures are located with that in mind. One of the interesting features of this boat is that the motor is mounted on the left side of the hull, so the propeller is also on the left side of the transom - not centered as per usual. David expects the top speed to be in the 30 mph category.



Tim Kowalik brought his larger computer printed ship to the meeting. This boat has been to show and tell before but this winter Tim gave it a major upgrade.



Better seen in these two photos:



That's right, a wooden deck! What a beautiful upgrade! Completely built from scratch and it is a one piece custom fit!! From the high tech looking boat that it clearly is, the deck moves it way up on the scale of also looking very classy!! Whew! Just beautiful! The boat is also fully lighted, the guns move up/down and rotate, and <u>all</u> squirt water! Yes, of course there is sound and more features. Spectacular boat! The stand is also specially designed to display the boat (that part is inside the carrier), and to get the boat to and from the pond on wheels; plus the wheels have two positions to also facilitate bringing other items to the pond with the boat. Honestly, we could do a special show of just the stands and contraptions people have fabricated to get boats to and from the ponds and to display them.

John Bishop brought some special fittings to the meeting to see if someone could help him with identifying the plating on these pieces:



These are far from ordinary hardware. The flange fits around the shaft of a propeller (airplane), and the bolts are special grade (also notice the drilling to permit safety wiring). John picked these up on line, but retail price for the bolts alone are in the \$400- \$500 price range. All very special hardware. If you have any information on the plating these have could you drop John a note at?

All evening I was thinking there was something that I was forgetting (quite the usual feeling these days), and it did come to light after the meeting when Glenn Davis showed me several RC boat magazines that prominently featured the EMYC. Glenn will bring them back for the next meeting and I will also include some of the pages in the April newsletter.
